The hospital facility has a responsibility to respond to health care needs unsupported by government programs. The charitable mission of the hospital facility, a member hospital of Baystate Health, is to improve the health of the people in our communities every day, with quality and compassion. The hospital's Community Benefits Mission is to reduce health disparities, promote community wellness, and improve access to care for vulnerable populations. The hospital facility meets all of the factors required of medical facilities in order to maintain tax exemption, as first described in Revenue Ruling 69-545. In support of patient care and the medical needs of the communities served by the hospital, medical staff membership and privileges are extended to all qualified physicians and practitioners in western Massachusetts who meet the requirements for credentialing and clinical privileges, whether employed by a related Baystate Health or
